


Postsecondary attainment in Florida

Awarded for completing a program of study/coursework







Awarded by professional associations, industry groups, vendors and government agencies



Awarded for passing a written, oral or performance-based exam







Time-limited; Must be Renewed




Awarded by Government Agencies




Awarded for fulfilling requirements such as degree/certificate attainment; certification; passing an exam; and/ or acquiring work experience

Legally required to perform certain jobs Florida is right at the national average for the share of projected job openings that require education and training beyond high school.



30 million American workers aged 25 to 64 have good jobs that pay without a BA




What is a good job?



In defining a good job, we chose \$35,000 (\$17 per hour for a full-time job) as the minimum earnings for those under age 45, and \$45,000 (\$22 per hour for a full-time job) for workers age 45 and older.




Of the **30 million good jobs** that do not require a Bachelor's degree, 24 million pay more than \$45,000 annually.

Good jobs declined in blue-collar industries and expanded in skilled-services industries.





In Florida good jobs also grew in blue-collar industries.

Change in number of non-BA good jobs 1991-2015




Between 1991 and 2015 Florida gained **142,000 blue-collar** non-BA good jobs, and **409,000 skilled-services** good jobs for workers without BAs.





Good jobs have gone to workers with associate's degrees and some postsecondary education and training.

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



Florida is one of a number of states in the South and West where good jobs grew.




In Florida the median annual earnings of non-BA workers with good jobs is \$54,000.

A majority of good jobs for workers without a BA are in skilled-services industries in Florida.

Health services is among the top five industries with non-BA good jobs in Florida.

Management is the occupation in which non-BA workers have the highest share of good jobs.

Rank	Occupation	Share of non-BA workers with good jobs
#1	Management	62%
#2	Healthcare practitioners and technical	51%
#3	Installation, maintenance and repair	44%
#4	Sales and related	32%
#5	Office and administrative support	24%

Conclusion

- Understanding where good jobs are by industry and occupation can connect workers to more opportunities.
- Education matters—good jobs have gone to workers with more education not only those with BAs.
- Strengthening the connection between school and work will create a smoother transition into the workforce.




