

#### Investing in Every Young Person in Florida Makes Sense

DREAMers – American in every way, except on paper.

- Florida already invests in these students through K12 public schools.
- Florida's Higher Education Coordinating Council (HECC) set goal of 55% attainment by 2025.
- HECC estimates that 784,000 additional working-age Floridians will need to acquire a postsecondary credential
- Many students without documentation are well prepared academically by our public schools and would complete with some financial assistance.
- "Culture of completion" should push for policies that support our students without documentation to be included in the 2025 goal.

#### Investing in Every Young Person in Florida Makes Sense

- In Florida, (DACA and DACA eligible) currently contribute almost \$78 million in state and local taxes (annually)
  - The median income of an immigrant with a Bachelor's is 156% higher than one with only a high school diploma or GED.
  - Bachelor's recipients pay an estimated \$2,138 more in taxes to state and local government than high school alone.




#### Undocumented Young People in Florida -Definitions


- DREAMers young persons qualified under the 2010 federal DREAM Act (did not pass).
  - > Young people brought to US as children without proper documentation
  - American in every way, except on paper.
- Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA).
  - Defers any deportations and allows young person to work. Not a path to citizenship.
  - No new applicants allowed after 2017 to present (program began in 2012)
  - Must:
    - be under 31 as of 6/2012, have come to the US under the age of 16, continuously lived in US from 2007 to present
    - In school, have graduated from high school, have obtained a GED, or been honorably discharged from armed forces



#### Undocumented Young People in Florida -Definitions

- Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
  - Dept of Homeland Security may add a foreign nation to the TPS list if there is an ecological disaster or societal crisis that makes returning to that nation a significant risk
  - People in the US with TPS:
    - Are not removable from the US
    - Can work legally
    - May be granted foreign travel authorization
  - Current TPS Countries: El Salvador, Haiti, Honduras, Nepal, Nicaragua, Somalia, Sudan, South Sudan, Syria, Yemen
    - In Florida, Haitians are the largest population of TPS recipients (32,500), followed by Hondurans (7,800) and Salvadorans (4,500)


Financial Aid Policies Regarding Undocumented Florida High School Graduates

- DREAMers and/or DACA/TPS recipients: Not eligible for federal aid including Pell Grants and federal loans
- Florida state aid: DREAMers/DACA/TPS/Undocumented not eligible for Bright Futures or need-based aid, other aid
- Florida in-state tuition: Undocumented students are eligible for in-state tuition (2014)
  - Only if graduated from FL HS & at least 3 years in FL schools
  - Went into effect 2014-15 school year (Gov. Scott signed 6/2014)



#### Undocumented Florida Students Utilizing In-State Tuition Policy


Out-of-State Tuition Waivers for Florida's State University System

#### Financial Aid Policies Regarding Undocumented Students

- States that offer financial aid (merit and need-based) to their undocumented high school graduates:
  - Texas (2,819 students/\$12 million 2016, 2% of total grant funds)
  - California
  - Washington
  - New Mexico
  - Minnesota
  - Oregon
  - New Jersey (513 students/\$1.63m first year)
  - Hawaii
  - Connecticut (January 2020)



Florida Policy Proposals


Florida Legislature 2019

- H.B. 457/ S.B. 1234 (2019) "Student Eligibility Requirements for State Financial Aid Awards and Tuition Assistance Grants"
- Rep. Carlos Guillermo-Smith/Rep. Fentrice Driskell/ Sen. Taddeo
- Extends state financial aid programs including need-based and meritbased (Bright Futures) to TPS and DACA Recipients (not broader DREAMer population)
- FPI estimates expense of \$3 to \$5 million



Florida Policy Institute recommendations:

- Expand eligibility for Florida's financial aid programs to undocumented;
- Match eligibility to current eligibility for out-of-state tuition waivers
  - Estimate of \$4 to \$7.6 million cost (2% of recipients)
- Invest in uniform training/support for college/univ to guide DREAMers
