Framing Activity:

This framework is helpful when discussing difficult topics like racial inequities by starting with a shared value with which others can buy in, and then sharing the facts of the current situation, which is not living up to the shared value.

Shared value Shows the issue as collective, not a personal one; helps with buy-in	e.g. "We as a community want all of our children to succeed."
Current state Shows how the current environment is not aligned with who we see ourselves to be as a community.	e.g. "Yet, currently minority children with the same risk factors are being removed from their homes at 4x the rate of white children."
Consequences Shows the cost of not addressing the problem, in short and/or long terms. You can also share the community cost of not addressing the problem.	e.g. "When students are removed from their homes, that instability significantly impacts their ability to thrive, and can lead to _% higher rates of school suspensions, tardiness, and absenteeism, which can result in poor academic performance."
Solution Rather than just share a problem, come prepared with a proposed solution that they can respond to or counter with other ideas.	e.g. "The higher rates of removal that differ by race rather than risk suggests there is a system barrier at work. We recommend a review of the removal policies to uncover the source of disparities."
Ask What specific step would you like them to take? How can they contribute?	e.g. "Can I have your support in reviewing removal policies?"
