## FCAN's Work



Research and Data FCAN publishes research and data on evidence-based practices and policy opportunities to strengthen Florida's talent pool.

Local college access networks (LCANs) LCANs represent $82 \%$ of the state's population. These organizations are made up of community leaders who come together to create solutions and partnerships to support local talent development.


Statewide Initiatives FCAN coordinates 4 College Ready Florida initiatives that support students in continuing their education after high school.

## Rural is Important

- More than one in four of America's public schools are rural.
- More than 8.9 million students attend rural schools.
- Nearly half of rural students are from low-income families.
- One in four rural students are students of color.


## Rural is Often Forgotten

- 7 cents on every philanthropic dollar invested in rural
- Federal policies often have an unconscious rural bias
- Lack of evidence based or research informed practices from rural places
- National perception that rural areas lack capacity and best practices

Programming Gaps
Students in Appalachian communities have limited access to high quality programs to meet their diverse needs, from cradle to career


Capacity Constraints
Schools and communities lack access to the tools, techniques, and supports needed to tackle the challenges students and families face

Sectors, systems, and funding are not aligned to meet the needs of our communities

## We have moved population level outcomes

Percent of $3^{\text {rd }}$ Graders Proficient in Math 2013-2019

$3^{\text {rd }}$ grade proficiency scores in reading and math have grown by 8 and 10 percentage points respectively, and have now surpassed the state average

## We have seen remarkable outcomes in school districts

Braiding multiple programs and interventions in Leslie County resulted in a remarkable school transformation

| $8^{\text {th }}$ Grade Reading Proficiency | Before PFE $47 \%$ | After PFE <br> 74\% |
| :---: | :---: | :---: |
| High School Graduation Rate | 68\% |  |
| High School State Ranking | $24^{4}$ |  |
