

REGIONAL ATTAINMENT

With 44.7% of Tampa Bay adults holding degrees and an estimated 10.5% a workforcerelevant certificate, Degree Attainment in the Tampa Bay region is **55.2% as of 2019 Cohort Year,** Slightly ahead of statewide figures.







The Problem: 330,000 Some College, No Degree

DATA INFORMED ACTION:

Leveraging resources like the Regional Competitiveness Report to improve talent supply

- LEAP regularly uses this report a collaboration of the Tampa Bay Partnership, Community Foundation Tampa Bay and United Way Suncoast – to help us understand how we should best target our efforts
- As an example, one of the reasons we started the Complete Tampa Bay initiative was to support disconnected youth (12.36% below) that may have started school but not completed.





National leader in college completion Lumina Foundation named **Tampa Bay one of 26 nationwide "Talent Hubs"**

for its plans to re-engage adult students through a completion coaching model called Complete Tampa Bay.

Focus – Students of Color & Low-Income

COMPLETE TAMPA BAY

FREE COACHING FOR THOSE WISHING TO RETURN TO SCHOOL

- Re-engage adult students with some college experience, but no credential
 - More than 330,000 such adults live in Hillsborough & Pinellas alone*
 - Partnered with HCC, SPC & USF, as well as local technical colleges
 - Offering support with applications, credit transfer, financial aid, etc.
 - Partnering with Urban Leagues of Hillsborough and Pinellas County For student support, as well as peer tutoring by Knack
 - <u>Prioritizing outreach to disadvantaged students</u>: 68% move beyond initial engagement 77% students of color 58% low-income


- Using **coaching model**, focus on the student and finding their best option for completion using a **Completion Coach**.
- Completion Coach works with individuals at the partner school to know the student's status for returning along with credits remaining, assists them readmission process
- Students who choose to pursue options outside of their previous school will work with the coach on a tiered system – what is available at a local partner or outside of the partner schools in the State of Florida.

Total Students




- Initial coach outreach began in October 2020 with 20 students

- As of April 15, 2022, total number of students was 1034






Student Demographics







NATIONAL & STATE ENROLLMENT FUNDING

Supporting Students Impacted by the Pandemic


- LEAP partners received \$100,000 from the National College Attainment Network, supported by Kresge Foundation, to help students from graduating classes of 2020 & 2021 enroll in some college this Fall.
- Our network received the only grant awarded in Florida 1 of just 12 given out of over 100 applications
- Leveraging a second award of \$45,000 from Florida College Access Network & Florida College System, supported by Helios Education Foundation
- Partnering with all our public universities and colleges, as well as our school districts on the initiative

Support Two-Year Community College Completion

Increase the number of students completing a post-secondary credential through advisory services, tutoring, and financial training.

Action Description: In partnership with colleges and organizations supporting student success, the City will decrease barriers to community college completion to uplift underserved Tampanians and close the city's gaps in access to and completion of post-secondary education.

Community colleges serve as a gateway to post-secondary education for approximately 40 percent of all undergraduates each year.³⁴ A third of these students are "first-generation" students from historically underserved populations and communities.35 However, while the open access policy of community colleges provides the educational opportunity, a majority of these first-generation students struggle to complete their credential. In fact, only 34 percent of Hillsborough County Community College students earned their degree in three years, one year longer than the estimated period of enrollment for fulltime students.³⁶ The primary barriers to completion include: 1) insufficient academic preparation, 2) student debt, 3) key family responsibilities, and 4) demanding work schedules.



Working in partnership with colleges and community-based organizations who currently provide student support, the City of Tampa will also target these barriers using the following actions: 1) advisory services, 2) tutoring, and 3) financial training. These are evidence-based practices that clear the way for individuals to earn a post-secondary credential and enter progressive employment opportunities, both of which are essential to building economic resilience across generations of families.


