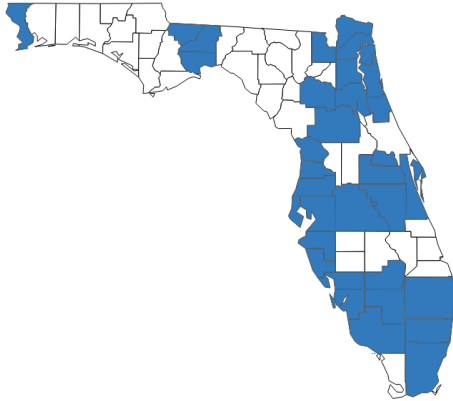

## Local College Access Networks



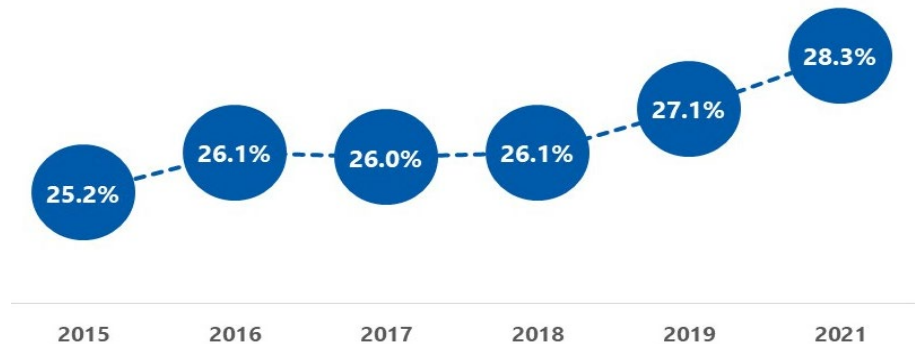
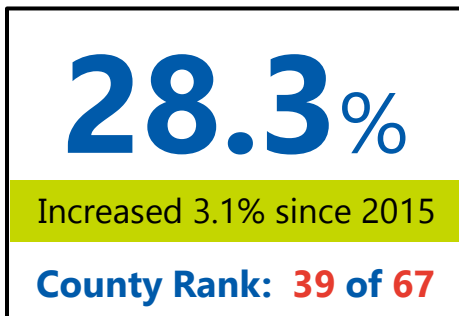

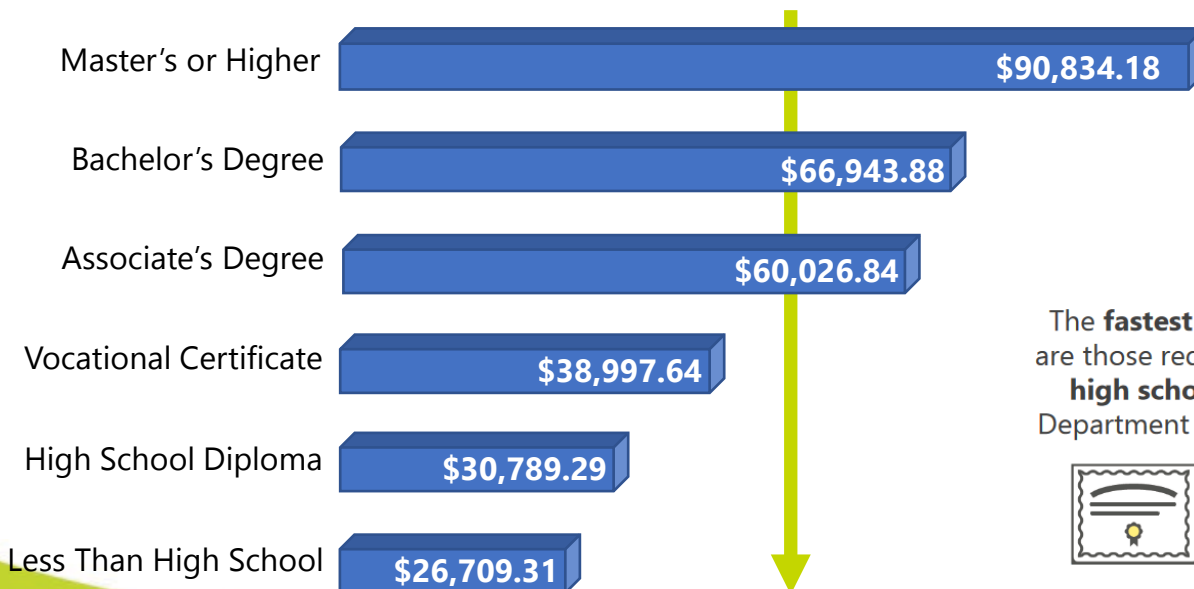

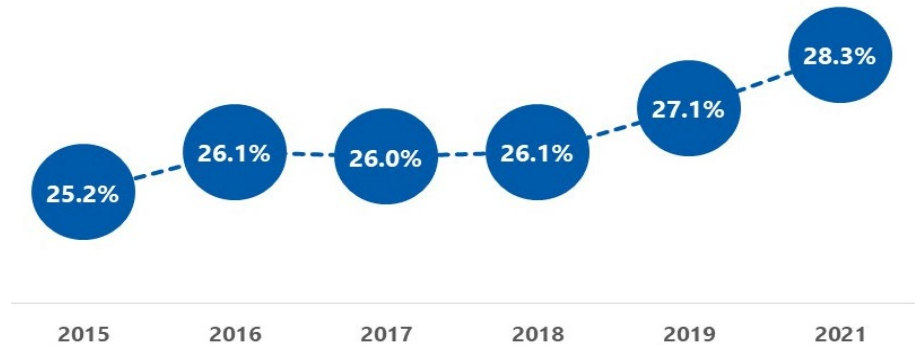

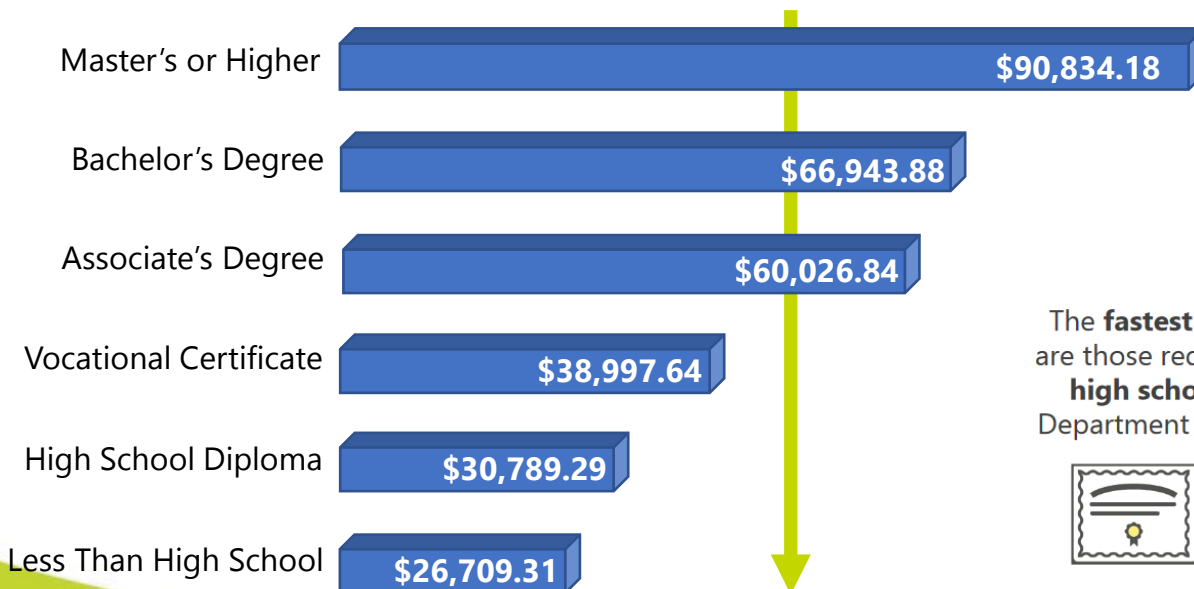

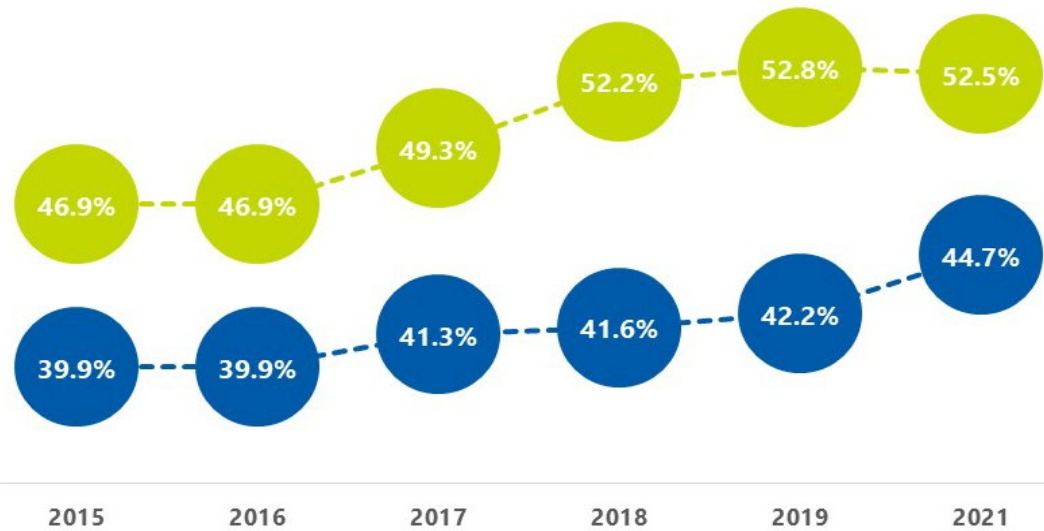

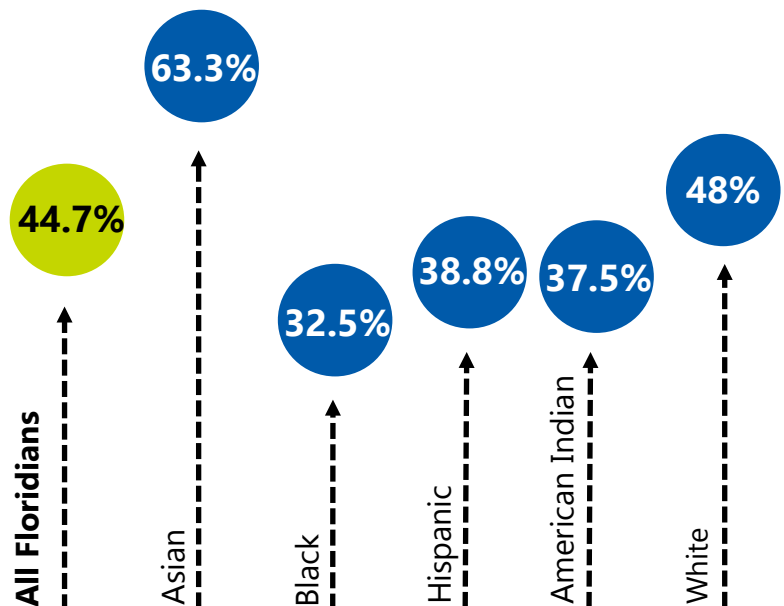
